

Democrats Praised By Boright

KENILWORTH — Praise for Mayor William J. Ahern, Jr., and his administration was given this week by former Mayor Walter E. Boright.

The former mayor cited the administration for its battle against the extension of Route 278, and the lack of financial indebtedness. "Not one cent of financial indebtedness has ever been incurred under a Democratic administration in the borough," he noted.

Frank J. Jphidos, Democratic candidate for Borough Council, pointed out that "Kenilworth can still boast of having one of the lowest taxes in metropolitan New Jersey despite the fact that the revaluation program was mandated under state law."

Councilman Frank J. Mascaro, candidate for reelection, noted that the "Republican candidates are the same men with the same lack of a program for Kenilworth that were rejected by the people of Kenilworth last year. The backing of these candidates for the second time by the Republicans is an indication of a lack of leadership."

Local Actor Commended For Leading TB Drive

KENILWORTH — Tom Long of Kenilworth, honorary chairman of the 1964 Christmas Seal campaign in Union County, today received a letter from the National Honorary Chairman Betsy Palmer, congratulating him on accepting this assignment.

Tom, a young actor with more than 10 years of experience in the entertainment field, will lead the fund raising campaign of the Union County Tuberculosis and Health League which opens in November with the mailing of Christmas Seals to residents of the county. He will assist Newton J. Rodgers of Clark, who is chairman of the Christmas Seal Committee of the League.

Miss Palmer, well-known on television, stage and screen, will lead the nation-wide campaign of more than 2,000 local associations to obtain the means to combat tuberculosis and other respiratory diseases.

Miss Palmer, whose mother is the executive director of a local tuberculosis association, cited the halt in the long-term decline in TB in this country, and the high TB risk group of 610,000 Americans which includes 110,000 known active cases, the 250,000 recently turned inactive ones and the contacts of new cases. She also pointed out that about 35 million Americans have tuberculosis germs in their bodies and thus are susceptible to breakdown with the disease in their lifetime. The broad category of respiratory diseases are now the fourth leading cause of death, preceded only by heart, cancer and strokes.

The Union County Tuberculosis and Health League's program to combat tuberculosis and other respiratory diseases, focuses on public and professional education, tuberculosis clinic services, case-

finding projects and support of medical research.

Thatcher Furnace Assets Purchased By Crane Co.

CRANFORD — The Crane Co. of New York this week announced the purchase of the assets of the Thatcher Furnace Co., wholly-owned subsidiary of the Holland Furnace Co., for an undisclosed amount.

Founded in 1850, Thatcher Furnace, manufactures boilers, furnaces, air conditioners and related equipment.

The Crane Co., founded as a manufacturer of plumbing fixtures, has developed operations in increasingly diversified fields in recent years.

It was announced that Russell M. Cook, former president of Thatcher, will serve as general manager of the Thatcher Furnace Division of the Crane Co.

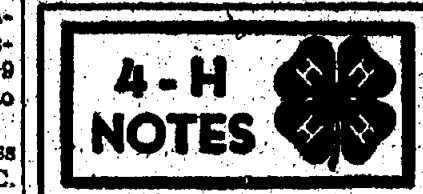

CD Participates in Mock Drill

KENILWORTH — Members of the Kenilworth Civil Defense and Disaster Control took part in "Operation Prep Medie," country-wide exercise, on Sunday afternoon.

Local CD members took part in a mock explosion of a railroad car in the area of Michigan Ave. and Route 22. The unit tested its emergency medical plan for the first time, which involved establishing a first aid medical post in the school gymnasium. Casualties, played by Boy Scouts, were picked up by ambulances and taken to the first aid center.

There they were examined and treated by a team of doctors and nurses and sent to Memorial General Hospital, Union. Members of the Jaycoos and American Legion post served as litter bearers.
